General Guidelines

- > Agree to treat each student with respect
- Agree to be a good role model for students by delivering positive messages about business, career, academics, goal setting, etc.
- Agree to never make presentations while under the influence of alcohol, or other drugs. In addition, speakers will not talk about intoxicants, including alcohol, tobacco or other drugs, or other negative behaviors in a positive way.
- Agree to never use sexual innuendo or to joke about anyone's sexual identity and preferences. Speakers will respect all races, cultures, ethnic groups and religions.
- > Agree to refrain from personal opinion taking preference to the material at hand.
- ➤ Agree not to meet with, talk with, or develop relationships with students beyond the classroom and/or outside of organization sponsored activities.

Interacting with Students

Young people - ages 12 through 18 - are considered adolescents, and this stage typically involves:

- Struggle with sense of identity
- Interests influenced by peer group
- Tendency to return to childish behavior particularly when stressed
- An interest mostly in present, limited thoughts of future
- Displays of shyness, blushing, and modesty
- Worries about being normal
- · Learn mostly by doing and seeing

Presenters should be careful to be sensitive to every student, regardless of age. Children are extremely sensitive and emotional, and to put them on the spot, or to criticize them can potentially turn their worlds upside down. A good rule of thumb is to always give the student the option to have an out. We forget that sometimes we can ask someone to read, when they can't read, or to share an experience, when they never reveal themselves publicly. Or, we say to a young person "that's wrong" when it took every ounce of courage for them to even respond.
